# South Ribble Borough Council Infrastructure Funding Statement 2023/2024

# Introduction to Infrastructure Funding Statement (IFS)

Following the Community Infrastructure Levy Regulations 2010 (as amended) Regulation 121A, it is now a requirement to publish an Infrastructure Funding (IFS) Statement annually. This report is a summary of developer contribution receipts, allocations, expenditure and any unspent or unallocated receipts collected from Section 106 agreements and Community infrastructure Levy (CIL) within the financial year 2023/24.

In addition, it is a requirement to publish an infrastructure list detailing any infrastructure projects or types of infrastructure which we intend will be, or may be, wholly or partly funded by CIL.

# 2. Developer Contributions

## 2.1. Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL)

CIL was introduced by South Ribble Borough Council on 1 September 2013. The levy is a charge on development involving new or additional gross internal area for residential and non-residential buildings, including extensions, annexes and new dwellings.

Its purpose is to help deliver infrastructure that is needed to meet the future growth needs of the borough. CIL can be used to fund a wide range of infrastructure including transport, flood defences, schools, hospitals and other health and social care facilities. It does not cover the delivery of affordable housing, which will still require a planning obligation under Section 106.

The regulations set out the methodology for how monies collected from the CIL are to be distributed as illustrated in the table below.

Purpose of Funding	% Allocated
Administration	5% of all receipts
Neighbourhood area portion	15% of CIL collected within that area capped at £100 per dwelling, excluding surcharges receipts
Neighbourhood area where there is a neighbourhood plan in place	25% of CIL collected within that area uncapped, excluding surcharges receipts.
CIL Infrastructure	All remaining CIL receipts collected for the financial year.

The CIL infrastructure proportion of South Ribble's CIL collected is passed on to Lancashire County Council (LCC) as part of our City Deal Partnership to be spent on infrastructure items approved within the <u>Infrastructure Delivery Plan</u>. Lancashire County Council are also required to publish an annual IFS report detailing what CIL funding passed over to them has been spent on.

Under the City Deal, a total of £434m new investment will lead to the expansion and improvement of the transport infrastructure in South Ribble and Preston enabling a forecasted 20,000 new jobs and 17,420 new homes to be created.

The City Deal finances are monitored using the Infrastructure Delivery Fund (IDF). Detailed operational financial arrangements for the IDF have been agreed by City Deal partners and the Fund is administered by the LCC as the accountable body for the City Deal. The IDF includes a mix of national and local resources from:

- Central Government Long term transport funding secured as part of Lancashire's Growth Deal
  and administered by the LEP, Highways England (formerly Highways Agency) funding for new
  and existing motorway junctions and retention of Homes England receipts from local land sales.
- LCC Capital Grants, New Homes Bonus and Land Receipts.
- South Ribble Borough and Preston City Councils Business Rate Retention and New Homes Bonus.
- Private Sector developer contributions.

CIL monies passed over to the City Deal, along with other sources of funding, have been spent on or continue to part fund the following infrastructure items:

- Cuerden Strategic Site;
- Samlesbury Enterprise Zone;
- Penwortham Bypass;
- A582 South Ribble Western Distributor;
- New Ribble Crossing; and
- Developments on Homes England strategic housing sites.

### 2.2. Section 106 Agreements

S106 agreements (a type of planning obligation) are a legal agreement authorised by Section 106 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 and made between local authorities, the owner of the land, who is normally the applicant/developer, and any other relevant party.

Planning Obligations are usually completed following a resolution to grant planning permission (normally major developments) to mitigate the impact of new developments.

Planning obligations are subject to three legal tests. These are that;

- they must be directly relevant to the proposed development, and
- necessary to make the development acceptable in planning terms; and
- fairly and reasonably related in scale and kind to the development.

S106 contributions can either be provided on-site, for example through the provision of affordable housing and public open space or off-site in the form of financial payments.

The planning obligations may also be non-financial, such as the provision of affordable housing or the creation of environmental monitoring schemes.

# 3.2. Infrastructure projects the authority intends will be, or may be, funded at least in part by CIL

CIL Infrastructure funds, passed over to the City Deal, along with other sources of funding, have been spent or continue to part fund the following infrastructure items:

- Cuerden Strategic Site;
- Samlesbury Enterprise Zone;
- Penwortham Bypass;
- A582 South Ribble Western Distributor;
- New Ribble Crossing; and
- Developments on Homes England strategic housing sites.

CIL receipts passed over to Parish / Town Councils (in accordance with Regulation 59A) are spent by those Parish / Town Councils in accordance with Regulation 59C.

Each Parish / Town Council must publish their own report annually to stipulate which projects have been funded, or part funded, by their CIL receipts as required by Regulation 121B. You will need to visit the Parish / Town Council websites to view their reports.

Any CIL receipts collected from areas where all or part of a chargeable development is not within the area of a Parish / Town Council, are collected by the Charging Authority as though a Parish / Town Council is in place. Such receipts must be expended as though they have been assigned to a Parish / Town Council in accordance with Regulation 59F.

There are currently no projects that have been identified for CIL funding by the 'South Ribble Parish Council'.

# 4. 2023/24 Projects Funded from S106 Contributions

# 4.1. McKenzie Arms Affordable Housing Development

This affordable housing development project delivered a total of 15 dwellings. This includes 12 (one and two bedroom) apartments and three (three bedroom) townhouses.

# 4.2. Jubilee Gardens Extra Care

The Jubilee Gardens Extra Care project is a mixed use development currently under construction. The project is set to deliver 75 self-contained aged care apartments alongside a commercial offer which will include a café and hair salon.
